Thief River Falls

by Brian Freeman

Storytelling that is so incredibly well done, you'll feel like a character inside the story. A fabulous read with a twist. I wasn't expecting the ending! This is a clean well written thriller. A lonely amnesic child witnessing a crime and being hunted by the villains. A former nurse, the now famous Lisa takes him in and fears for her life as well as his. This story base was for many thrillers, but every basic story can be told in multiple ways and being told by B. Freeman, with new protagonists and new twists, made it very interesting.

The Titanic and the City ofWidows It Left Behind—TheForgotten Victims of the FatalVoyageby Julie Cook

In this historical narrative, the author gives us glimpses into the lives of the survivors of the less fortunate Titanic crew members. The sea-faring city of Southampton was the home of 549 crew members who perished on the Titanic. Many were labeled as cowards for not dving "as a man should". Others, like Robert Hitchens who was in charge of a lifeboat that failed to go back to save more passengers was filled with guilt that led him to heavy drinking. Those affected by survivor's guilt were left to "carry on" as this was a time before counseling and support groups.

History buffs will find this book an absorbing account of life among ordinary people struggling against poverty in the early 1900s. It gives readers a new perspective on the Titanic disaster.

3 tablespoons ground cinnamon 2 teaspoons ground ginger 2 teaspoons ground nutmeg 1 1/2 teaspoons ground allspice 1 1/2 teaspoons ground cloves

In a small bowl, whisk together cinnamon, ginger, nutmeg, allspice, and cloves until well combined. Store in a small jar or container.
