The AWE Station offers children a safe, standalone computer not connected to the Internet that is ageappropriate, engaging, and academi-

cally relevant for children. It is designed to support school readiness and technology access while making learning exciting and engaging.

This provides an opportunity for parents to introduce their children to computer skills, or to provide the child with learning on their own while the parent completes tasks on the library computer.


WORD OF THE DAY—DEFER

THANKS TO OUR VOLUNTEER!





FEATURED AUTHORS

Each month, the library features an author and displays their books. This quarter features three of our most popular authors. Come view the display and check out a few of these books.

October-Nora Roberts, aka J. D. Robb

Nora Roberts is an American author of more than 225 romance novels. She writes as J. D. Robb for the **In Death** series and has also written under the pseudonyms Jill

March and for publications in the U.K. as Sarah Hardesty. Roberts was the first author to be inducted into the Romance Writers of America Hall of Fame.





November-John Sanford

John Sanford is the pseudonym of John Roswell Camp, an American author and journalist. Camp won the Pulitzer Prize in journalism in 1986 and was one of four finalists for the prize in 1980. He also was the winner of the Distinguished Writing Award of the American Society of Newspaper Editors for 1985. Camp is the author of fifty-four published novels, as of the summer of 2022, all of which have appeared, in one format or another, on the New York Times best-seller lists, many debuting at #1.

December-Harlan Coben

Harlan Coben is an American writer of mystery novels and thrillers. The plots of his novels often involve the resurfacing of unresolved or misinterpreted events in the past, murders, or fatal accidents and have multiple twists. Among his novels are two series, each involving the same protagonist set in and around New York and New Jersey; some characters appear in both. Coben has won an Edgar Award, a Shamus Award, and an Anthony Award—the first author to receive all three. His books have been translated into 43 different languages and sold over 60 million copies.

DID YOU KNOW?

Adding stamps to mail has been standard practice since before the U.S. was actually a country. In fact, the idea is hardly American itself. Countries across Europe were using postage to mail letters long before the U.S. was ever thought of, let alone organizing a post office. Postage dates back as early as the 1600s, starting with an ink stamp proving that the delivery fee had been paid. In the 1800s, postage that was placed on packages themselves was adopted as the norm with pressed wafer papers. Later in the same century, more studies were performed, leading toward the more modern use of stamps that are durable and that self-adhere to letters and packages.
