ECLIPSES-ANNULAR AND SOLAR

ANNULAR SOLAR ECLIPSE

An annular solar eclipse happens when the Moon passes between the Sun and Earth, but when it is at or near its farthest point from Earth. Because the Moon is farther away from Earth, it appears smaller than the Sun and does not completely cover the Sun. As a result, the Moon appears as a dark disk on top of a larger, bright disk, creating what looks like a ring around the Moon. The next annular eclipse in the U.S. will be on **Oct. 14, 2023**.

TOTAL SOLAR ECLIPSE

A total solar eclipse happens when the Moon passes between the Sun and Earth, completely blocking the face of the Sun. People located in the center of the Moon's shadow when it hits Earth will experience a total eclipse. The sky will darken, as if it were dawn or dusk. Weather permitting, people in the path of a total solar eclipse can see the Sun's corona, the outer atmosphere, which is otherwise usually obscured by the bright face of the Sun. A total solar eclipse is the only type of solar eclipse where viewers can momentarily remove their eclipse glasses (which are not the same as regular sunglasses) for the brief period of time when the Moon is completely blocking the Sun. The next total solar eclipse in the U.S. will be on **April 8, 2024**.




From left to right, these images show a total solar eclipse, annular solar eclipse, and partial solar eclipse. Nasa.gov


SALUTE TO OUR VOLUNTEERS





She set up The Fern Michaels[®] Foundation which allows her to grant four year scholarships to needy, deserving students. She then opened pre-school and day care centers with affordable rates for single moms who are having a hard time of it. She has also donated over 40 bullet-proof vests to K-9 dogs across the country. She also provided two K-9 dogs to police departments in New York and Connecticut. She doesn't believe she is a great writer, but she does think she is one hell of a story teller. October is National Reading Group Month. What better time to join the library's Book Club! You will meet fellow book lovers, read and discuss authors, genres, and subjects that may be new to you, and share your favorite books. The club meets the 4th Tuesday of the month at 1:30 with the exception of November and December; see below.

Here's what the Book Club is reading this quarter.

October 24 -*Wrapped in Rain* by Charles Martin Two half-brothers try to survive the fallout of their traumatic childhood and their abusive, alcoholic father in this tender and beautiful story about the power of forgiveness.

On a sprawling Southern estate, Tucker and his younger brother, Mutt, were raised by their housekeeper, Miss Ella Rain, who loved the motherless boys like her own. Hiring her to take care of Waverly Hall and the boys was the only good thing their abusive and alcoholic father

ever did.

When his brother escapes from a mental hospital and an old girlfriend appears with her son and a black eye, Tucker is forced to return home and face the agony of his tragic past. Though Miss Ella has been gone for many years, Tucker can still hear her voice—and her prayers. "Life is a battle, but you can't fight it with your fists. You got to fight it with your heart." But finding peace and starting anew will take a measure of grace that Tucker scarcely believes in. Wrapped in Rain follows Tucker's journey from brokenness to healing through the everlasting power of love.

November 14 - Deadly Keepsakes by Anita Dickason, local author! Meet the au-

thor via Zoom! When Tori Winters becomes the star witness in a murder trial, someone tries to kill her. Terrified, she's not giving the killer a second chance. With all her worldly possessions packed in her car, Tori is on the run. A mysterious phone call about an inheritance leads her to Granbury. After all, who would look for her in a small, quaint Texas town?

Instead, Tori's life is about to spin into an existence where nothing is as it seems. The historic house she inherits is steeped in secrets from the past. Secrets that may prove deadly. She's a stranger in a strange town. Who can she trust? There is the disinherited step-grandson and the lawyer and his son. What are they hiding?



Tori's inheritance may not be a blessing when a killer strikes again. It could be her death warrant.
