LARGE PRINT BOOKS



WORD OF THE MONTH—HUMIDITY

Now that summer is here, most of us are complaining about the humidity. Here's how The New Dictionary of Cultural Literacy defines the word: The amount of water vapor in the air. Humidity is measured in two ways: (1) Absolute humidity is the percentage of water vapor actually present in the air. (2) Relative humidity is the absolute humidity divided by the amount of water that could be present in the air. Relative humidity indicates the degree of comfort or discomfort one feels from the humidity, because it indicates the amount of perspiration that can evaporate from the skin.

- It gives you a break amidst the madness of life.




CREDO COMPLETE CORE COLLECTION

TEXAS SUMMER TEMPERATURE EXTREMES



So who has the coolest summers in Texas? The answer is in the Panhandle, particularly around and north of Amarillo. Amarillo has an average summer temperature of 76.5 degrees, according to the National Weather Service

And the hottest? On average, temperatures hit at least 90 degrees on 133 days a year in this city on the southern tip of Texas, according to The Weather Channel. Temperatures don't soar only in the summertime—



Brownsville's hottest day on record was March 27, 1984, when the high hit 106 degrees Fahrenheit.
