CHILDREN'S BOOKS—MANY CHOICES

The library has an extensive collection of books for children and young people. Here are the categories of reading and listening resources you will find at the library:

1. Easy—As the name implies, these are for young readers, including preschoolers whose parents read to them. Most are fiction, but there are good number of non-fiction titles too which are designated by a yellow stripe at the base of the spine.
2. READ—these books are arranged and designated by the reading level of the book and range from 1.0 to 5.3.
3. Juvenile—Labeled with a “J”, includes an extensive collection of fiction and non-fiction books. Within fiction can be found series such as “Dork Diaries”, “Captain Underpants”, “I Survived”, “Magic Tree House”, “Hank the Cow Dog”, “Wishbone”, “Ramona”, and of course classics such as “Nancy Drew” and “The Hardy Boys”.
4. Popular graphic novels such as “Pokemon”, “Dog Man”, “Avatar” and many more are another option.
5. A selection of audio books for young folks is also available.
6. Bluebonnet award books can be found in this section of the library.




DID YOU KNOW?

The 1939 novel *Gadsby* is the longest book ever published that doesn't contain the letter 'e.' Back in 1939, American author Ernest Vincent Wright published *Gadsby*, a 50,000-word novel that doesn't use the letter 'e' once. What's more, it's not the only novel that ditched the letter. Author Georges Perec also wrote the French-language book *La Disparition* without the letter 'e' in 1969. That's even more astounding when you consider that 'e' is the most commonly used letter in the English (and French!) language.

HOW CHOCOLATE IS MADE

Cocoa pods on the cacao tree get picked when they are a burgundy brown color—this is when they are ripe. Inside the cocoa pod are between 20-50 seeds—this is what we know as cocoa beans, although they taste pretty sour when first picked and nothing like chocolate.



The cocoa beans then go into a box to ferment. Then they are laid out in large trays to dry out in the sun. Then they are sent off to the factories.

The cocoa nibs are crushed up and ground into a paste. This paste is called cocoa mass. You could melt the paste at this stage and make a chocolate bar, but it would taste really bitter. Melted cocoa mass is called cocoa liquor. Some of the cocoa mass is kept for later, the rest is pressed by a machine which squeezes out the cocoa butter in it. What's left behind is a pressed powder cake. This is ground up and becomes cocoa powder.

The cocoa mass we kept is now mixed with the cocoa butter and sugar is added. Sometimes other ingredients are added too, such as vanilla flavor and milk. The blended chocolate then goes through rollers to improve the texture and make it more smooth.



The final process is called tempering, where chocolate is heated and then cooled. This makes sure the crystal structure in chocolate behaves itself and that chocolate looks nice and shiny when you open the wrapper to your chocolate bar. Adapted from: miniummers.com
