LARGE PRINT BOOKS

Every three months, the library receives 50 new Large Print books from the Central Texas Library System (CTLS) which our patrons can check out. That means this year, you will have a selection of 200 Large Print Books to choose from. This is in addition to the more than 600 Large Print books in our permanent collection. Take advantage of this



limited time opportunity to find new titles for your reading pleasure.

SimplyE— eBOOKS AND AUDIO BOOKS



SimplyE is an open source app that makes it easier for patrons to discover, borrow and read or listen to library e-books and audiobooks. It is available on the Apple App Store or Google Play Store. Simply install the app, select "Lake Whitney Public Library" from the list. You will be presented with a list of eBooks and audio books. Select a book, then use your library card number and phone number to log in; the book

is available to read on your phone or tablet for 20 days. Selections include fiction and non-fiction for adults and young adults as well as selections for children middle grade.

TEXAS LIBRARY SYSTEM RESOURCES

Another resource for our patrons include the Learning Express Library. Included in the library are courses for college preparation; college skills development; building language and math skills for adults; GED preparation; computer skills in Windows and Microsoft applications; resources for Spanish speakers, and more.



Log into the library website, www.whitneylibary.org using your library card and phone number, select a course, then register with Learning Express which will track your progress as you work through the course.



A valuable database search tool is Gale Academic OneFile, which is now aligned with many of those available to K-12 libraries, providing opportunities for collaboration among schools, academic libraries

and a consistent user experience for Texas learners of all ages.

Fredrik Backman is the #1 *New York Times* bestselling author of *A Man Called Ove, My Grandmother Asked Me to Tell You She's Sorry, Britt-Marie Was Here, Beartown, Us Against You*, and *Anxious People*, as well as two novellas and one work of nonfiction. His books are published in more than forty countries. He lives in Stockholm, Sweden, with his wife and two children.

truly wants to believe that people are inherently good, even when they do things that should prove otherwise.

Grandma Gatewood's Walk by Ben Montgomery is a biography of Emma Gatewood who, at sixty-seven years old walked 800 miles along the 2,050-mile Appalachian Trail. Driven by a painful marriage, Grandma Gatewood not only hiked the trail alone, she was the first person—man or woman—to walk it twice and three times. At age seventy-one, she hiked the 2,000-mile Oregon Trail. Gatewood became a hiking celebrity. The public attention she brought to the trail was unprecedented. Her vocal criticism of the lousy, difficult stretches led to bolstered maintenance, and very likely saved the trail from extinction.
