ECLIPSES—ANNULAR AND SOLAR

ANNULAR SOLAR ECLIPSE

An annular solar eclipse happens when the Moon passes between the Sun and Earth, but when it is at or near its farthest point from Earth. Because the Moon is farther away from Earth, it appears smaller than the Sun and does not completely cover the Sun. As a result, the Moon appears as a dark disk on top of a larger, bright disk, creating what looks like a ring around the Moon. The next annular eclipse in the U.S. will be on **Oct. 14, 2023**.

TOTAL SOLAR ECLIPSE

A total solar eclipse happens when the Moon passes between the Sun and Earth, completely blocking the face of the Sun. People located in the center of the Moon's shadow when it hits Earth will experience a total eclipse. The sky will darken, as if it were dawn or dusk. Weather permitting, people in the path of a total solar eclipse can see the Sun's corona, the outer atmosphere, which is otherwise usually obscured by the bright face of the Sun. A total solar eclipse is the only type of solar eclipse where viewers can momentarily remove their eclipse glasses (which are not the same as regular sunglasses) for the brief period of time when the Moon is completely blocking the Sun. The next total solar eclipse in the U.S. will be on **April 8, 2024**.




From left to right, these images show a total solar eclipse, annular solar eclipse, and partial solar eclipse. Nasa.gov


SALUTE TO OUR VOLUNTEERS



Continued Learning: Khan Academy, DuoLingo, or SimplyE Read-A-Loud


Lego Creation Station: Legos provided, even larger ones for younger kids; just bring your imagination!

Fern Michaels is the pen name of Mary Ruth Kuczki who grew up in Hastings, Pennsylvania. Family and friends call her Dink, a name her father gave her when she was born because according to him she was ‘a dinky little thing’ weighing in at four and a half pounds. However, she answers to Fern since people are more comfortable with a name they can pronounce. Having been a voracious reader as a child, she began writing over 50 years ago and has written 161 books, most of them New York Times bestsellers.

She set up The Fern Michaels® Foundation which allows her to grant four year scholarships to needy, deserving students. She then opened pre-school and day care centers with affordable rates for single moms who are having a hard time of it. She has also donated over 40 bullet-proof vests to K-9 dogs across the country. She also provided two K-9 dogs to police departments in New York and Connecticut. She doesn’t believe she is a great writer, but she does think she is one hell of a story teller.

The library has 115 of her books including several in large print and audio. All are available for checkout.





The Texas Bluebonnet Award is one of the most prestigious children’s choice literary awards in the United States. Each year, 20 books are chosen for the Texas Bluebonnet Award Master List. Schools and libraries around the state participate in the program, encouraging students to read a minimum of five books from the list. In January, students vote for their favorite title.

The author of the book receiving the most votes wins the Texas Bluebonnet Award (TBA) which is presented at the Texas Bluebonnet Award presentation held during the TLA Annual Conference in the spring. In 2024, students will vote on the following list:

January 2024\23 \2024—*Lessons In Chemistry* By Bonnie Garmus

Chemist Elizabeth Zott is not your average woman. In fact, Elizabeth Zott would be the first to point out that there is no such thing as an average woman. But it's the early 1960s and her all-male team at Hastings Research Institute takes a very unscientific view of equality. Except for one: Calvin Evans; the lonely, brilliant, Nobel-prize nominated grudge-holder who falls in love with—of all things—her mind. True chemistry results.

But like science, life is unpredictable. Which is why a few years later Elizabeth Zott finds herself not only a single mother, but the reluctant star of America's most beloved cooking show *Supper at Six*. Elizabeth's unusual approach to cooking ("combine one tablespoon acetic acid with a pinch of sodium chloride") proves revolutionary. But as her following grows, not everyone is happy. Because as it turns out, Elizabeth Zott isn't just teaching women to cook. She's daring them to change the status quo.



Laugh-out-loud funny, shrewdly observant, and studded with a dazzling cast of supporting characters, *Lessons in Chemistry* is as original and vibrant as its protagonist.
